The Myers Residence - a Great Place to Be

Groups and individuals have visited The Myers Residence as visitors, volunteers, for meetings, or to engage in activities. These visits and meetings take place despite the fact that the restoration of the building is far from complete. The Myers historic site draws people because of its special significance as a well-documented site of national significance. The site is on the National Register of Historic Places, the NYS Underground Railroad Freedom Trail and the National



Network to Freedom of the National Park Service. In the month of May 2014 alone, Young Abolitionists have met at the residence twice, members of the Hudson Mohawk Appalachian Mountain Club have come to work in laying out a

walking path, staff and volunteers from the Martin Van Buren Historic site visited, and a group of 15 people came from SUNY Delhi to participate in an interactive History Day Program. In addition to this our volunteer gardeners, and many people attending the numerous recent plant sales, have visited.

include more than just the building of the Myers Residence. URHPCR owns six property lots adjacent to and near The Myers Residence. The other lots variously include one that was once lived on by Abram Johnson, Harriet Myers' father, and one lived on by Dr. Thomas Elkins, another key abolition activist. Several other lots



support the work of The Myers Residence in various ways. Combined with other volunteers and members of URHPCR, some twenty people helped upgrade and expand the trail between Third Street and Livingston Avenue that stretches across the Abram Johnson Garden.

Staff, volunteers and friends of the Martin Van Buren Historic Site recently visited The Myers Residence

to look at what a site in development was like and how URHPCR to learn interprets the Underground Railroad history of the site. It was an opportunity for networking and exploring important features of the Myers Site story.
