## Visitor's Guide to the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center

itting on a high bluff overlooking the Ohio River in downtown Cincinnati, the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center educates thousands of visitors each year about the worldwide struggle for freedom and human rights. In several aspects the Center's stated mission parallels that of Underground Railroad History Project. Its goals are "to reveal stories of freedom's heroes, from the era of the Underground Railroad to contemporary times, challenging and inspiring everyone to take courageous steps of freedom today."



In October I attended the "Fifty Years after Freedom Summer" conference sponsored by Miami University of Ohio. The first day's events took place at the Center

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and I took advantage of the opportunity to inspect its many exhibits. The first thing I learned about this spacious, modern structure which opened in 2004 was that it is much more than a building dedicated to preserving the history of the underground railroad. Street signs direct visitors to the "Freedom Center" and freedom

is the central theme of its displays and programs.

The first floor contains administrative offices and a well stocked gift shop. I browsed its collection of books on African American history, the Underground Railroad, and the Civil Rights Movement and couldn't resist purchasing a delightful picture book about the sit-ins for my grandchildren. I was also pleased to find recordings by Schoharie County musicians Kim and Reggie Harris among the CDs available for sale. Those who would like a t-shirt or coffee mug to remember their visit will not be disappointed.

Taking the advice of a helpful docent, I began my tour at the "From Slavery to Freedom" exhibit on the third floor. This area traces the history of people of African descent in North America from the early days of the slave trade to the end of Reconstruction. Also included



are the stories of other people fighting for freedom such as women and Native Americans. Also on the third floor, the "Invisible: Slavery Today" section reminds visitors that more than 12 million people worldwide are enslaved today. It relates the stories of five individuals trapped in forced labor, child bondage, sex trafficking, and domestic servitude and suggests (Cont'd. on p. 2)

actions to halt these abuses. The area devoted to "Everyday Freedom Heroes" contains portraits and quotes from modern freedom fighters such as Marion Wright Edelman, Cesar Chavez, the Dali Lama, and Martin Luther King.

The exhibit I found most compelling was situated on the Center's second floor. It is a two story, rough-hewn log building used by Captain John W. Anderson, a Kentucky slave trader, to temporarily hold enslaved people before they were transported for sale in the Deep South. Discovered only 50 miles from Cincinnati, the structure was disassembled and rebuilt inside the Center. Its impact was greater because it closely resembles the slave pen in which Solomon Northup described being confined in "12 Years a Slave." An adjoining photo display traces the land and water routes used to deliver the unfortunate captives to their final destination in Natchez, Mississippi.

The Center also is a venue for artistic presentations. The main hall on the second floor is dominated by two floor-to-ceiling wall hangings created by Ohio fabric artist Aminah Brenda Lynn Robinson. Done in a folk art style similar to the work of Faith Ringgold, these pieces trace Robinson's world travels and her personal

journey. A special exhibition for the Freedom Summer conference was "All for the Cause" by Cincinnati artist, Larry Collins. It consists of portraits painted in the style of religious icons of 34 people killed during the Civil Rights Movement. The Harriet Tubman Theatre, also on this floor, offers continuous showings of "The Suite to Freedom," an impressionistic animated film about slavery, freedom, and the Underground Railroad with an inspirational musical score.

The National Underground Freedom Center is well worth a visit by both young and old. Guests should allow three or four hours to take in all of the exhibits. It is easily accessible off Interstate 75 or 71. Perched between Paul Brown Stadium, home of the Bengals, and the Great American Ballpark, home of the Reds, the Center offers plenty of parking, but you should check schedules to avoid game days. The Center's proximity to the ball parks also provides easy access to a variety of dining establishments.

## The Myers Residence Rising: External Restoration Nears Completion

We have passed day 101, as of November 25<sup>th</sup>, of the work being completed under the current work contract on the Myers Residence. The various contracts in recent years have restored the chimneys and gutters, repaired the seriously damaged back wall, eliminated cracks in the side walls and rebuilt and reinforced a basement wall. There still

remains much to be done. As we go to print the windows are being replaced. Soon we will have a building where we can have heat inside to warm it in colder months.





The Myers Residence is an artifact and monument to the work of the abolitionist community in Albany. While it is a shame that so many of the other buildings that are related to this history have been lost, it is our good fortune that this building, which can be tied to the Myers' story, the Vigilance Committee, and known Freedom Seekers who were referred there, has remained for us to celebrate the important history that is the Underground Railroad story. — Paul Stewart
