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A New Paradigm for the Underground Railroad Public History Conference: A Look at the 2017 Keynote Speeches

sixteenth annual conference marked a paradigm change with the introduction of a new signature phrase - "Liberty Con;" a venue change; and two remarkable keynote addresses! The paradigm change incorporated more round-table discussions than in previous conferences. The round-table format encouraged the participation of everyone attending the conference. The venue change took us to Schenectady County Community College (SCCC), Schenectady, New York. At SCCC all of the conference activities, except lunch on Saturday, were under one roof. The two remarkable keynote addresses, the focus of this article, were delivered by Tim Wise, Anti-Racism Activist, Writer, Educator, and Public Speaker; and CeLillianne Green, Lawyer, Poet, Teacher, Mediator, Playwright, and Speaker.

The 2017 Liberty Con adopted the theme "Americans@Risk: Race, Denial, Privilege, and Who Matters." Both the Friday night and Saturday morning keynote speakers effectively addressed every element of the conference theme, and more.

The title of Tim Wise's Friday night speech – "Racism, Denial, and Movement Building" – was a slight revision of the conference theme. His style of

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delivery was reminiscent of a preacher / teacher with dynamic animation, and, even with a bit of humor, he provided an empirical, historical overview of White skin privilege. One of his most memorable statements came as something of an afterthought or



a footnote. The statement was intended to illustrate that to the American mind, policy statements that begin with or include the word "all," refers to Whites. Or, put another way, in the USA, White is silent in statements like "all lives matter."

The Saturday morning keynote speech by CeLillianne Green, was entitled "Cross Roads," and focused on the enduring obstacles to securing the principles of liberty and justice for all in the USA. Her

style of delivery was that of a poet / teacher. With profound griot-like, musically rhythmic, poetic prose, she invoked the spirit of the ancestors to overview historical and current issues that put Americans@Risk. With simple eloquence, she dismantled the notion



that "color-blindness" is a positive pursuit. Literally, she noted that color-blindness is a "disorder of the eye." To pursue a "color-blind" social policy is to render invisible people who are visibly Black, Brown, Red, or Yellow. Instead of invoking the pathology of color-blindness, we should see color, but we should not discriminate because we see color.

The messages in Green's "Cross Roads" and Wise's "Racism, Denial, and Movement Building" were comparable to two sides of the same coin. Both were engaging, informative, and inspiring. Together these two speeches illustrated the conference theme and set the stage for panel presentations, round table discussions, educational games, poster displays, and an art exhibit that add up to one of our best conferences ever!

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July 4th Oration: Truth, Justice, and the American Way, according to Stephen Myers and Dr. Thomas Elkins

In the aftermath of enslavement in New York a handful of Black activists distinguished themselves as leaders of the struggle for Black rights. In our effort to recover the stories of these key people, two individuals stand out..

Stephen Myers is perhaps the best known. While more remains to be learned, enough detail has been assembled to tell his story and reflect on its importance in relationship to liberty and justice and the kind of society he sought to achieve.

Dr. Thomas Elkins is another individual who stands out. Although he did not leave many personal writings, aspects of his story are reported in the local press. Supplementing the press accounts is a large artifact collection unearthed from the property on



which Elkins lived for over thirty years. These artifacts have stories to tell.

On July 4th Paul Stewart and Janine Moon will explore these stories and their relationship with Frederick Douglass's 1852 speech, *What to the Slave is Your Fourth of July?*. Paul is co-founder of URHPCR and Scholar-in-Residence at Russell Sage College. He has explored the life of Stephen Myers for the last 19 years. Janine Moon, with a Master's degree in Public History and experience in curatorial work, is on the staff of the Albany Institute of History and Art and volunteers as a collections curator and interpreter with URHPCR.

In Memoriam - Scott Christianson 1947 —2017



Our dear friend Scott Christianson passed away on May 14th of this year in an accident at his home. Scott was a friend of URHPCR and a member and workshop speaker at our annual conferences. He helped organize the first conference in 2002.

According to the Times Union newspaper obituary, his wife Tamar described him as one who "combined a voracious curiosity with a deep sense of social justice — and a keen nose for a great story". Scott was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize and profiled as "one of the nation's top 20 investigative reporters" for his work at the Knick News.

Scott was particularly important in the 2010 conference at which he led a UGRR walking tour of Troy and collaborated with artist Mark Priest who presented his paintings of the fugitive slave rescue of Charles Nalle, on which Scott had published a book, *Freeing Charles: the Struggle to Free a Slave on the Eve of the Civil War*.

Scott Christianson will be well remembered for his contributions to a great American story.
