Conference: Connecting Pathways

t's that time of year again and UGRHPCR is mounting its annual conference. This year's event, "The Underground Railroad: Connecting Pathways to Liberty," will take place at Russell Sage College in Troy, New York from Friday, February 24 through Sunday, February 26.

Expanding on last year's schedule, we have added a special keynote address on Friday evening by Professor David Blight, Director of the Gilder Lehrman Center for the Study of Slavery, Resistance and Abolition at Yale University. Dr. Blight is one of the nation's most widely recognized authorities on the history of the Civil War, race relations, historical memory and the legacy of slavery. He is the author of *Beyond the Battlefield: Race, Memory, and the Civil War* (2002) and *Race and Reunion: The Civil War in American Memory* (2001), as well as other books and articles.

Blight's address, "Why Such a Hold on Our Imagination? The Underground Railroad in History and Memory," will commence a dinner celebrating the fifth anniversary of URHPCR's history conference. The dinner starts at 6:30 pm. Reservations are required and must be made by February 10, 2006.

On Saturday, conference events will kick off with a second keynote address by Professor Erica Ball of Un-

ion College in Schenectady and a URHPCR Board member, who specializes in Black abolitionism and northern Black political activism before and during the Civil War. She is currently finishing a manuscript titled *Mothers and Fathers of the Race:* A Cultural History of Northern Black Activism During the Civil War Era. Ball will speak at Russell Sage's Bush memorial on "Brothers, Sisters, Revolutionaries: Freedom Seekers, Activists and the Underground Railroad."

Saturday's workshops are as diverse as they are plentiful. Among them will be sessions on using the web to research abolitionism, slavery and the Underground Railroad, writing freedom seeking into fiction, and Black troops in the Civil War. A number of dramatic reenactments will also be presented

Workshop presenters include academics, writers, amateur historians and even local schoolchildren

Our New Executive Director



RHPCR has turned an exciting corner: we now have staff.

In January, the board hired Mary Liz Stewart, one of the founding organizers of the Project, as Executive Director. Mary Liz's work will involve developing the operations and

capacities of URHPCR, advancing the restoration of the Stephen and Harriet Myers Residence Historic Site, and organizing the annual conference and other educational programming. She comes to this position with more than ten years experience in education, and practical experience in research, grant writing, organizational development and fundraising. Support for this position is provided in part by the Community Foundation of the Capital Region with a grant from its Education and Recognition of the Underground Railroad History Fund.

Fundraising Notes

e are delighted to announce several grants received in the last few months: In December, Citizens Bank generously provided a \$5,000 grant. M & T Bank also generously committed \$5,000 to our project.

This January we are starting work on the restoration of the Stephen and Harriet Myers Residence under a \$75,000 grant from Heritage New York. Last June we were awarded a \$50,000 award from the NYS Environmental Protection Fund, also for restoration of the Myers Residence. State Assembly representatives Jack McEneny and Ron Canestrari are working to add another \$50,000 to this amount. We thank them for their continued support. We currently have requests pending for much of the \$355,000 needed for the restoration of the first floor inte-

rior and for the exterior of the building.

Thanks to the Community Foundation of the Capital Region for a grant through its Education and Recognition of the Underground Railroad History Fund, which, when combined with other sources, makes it possible for us to hire staff for 2006.

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from New Covenant Charter School in Albany who will present a workshop on "What the Underground Railroad Means to Me". As always, it will be a diverse conference that draws widely from the community of Underground Railroad researchers and activists.

To continue the anniversary celebration, Saturday will be capped off with a dance party led by Earl White, the leading African American old-time fiddler in the country. White was a founding member of the Green Grass Cloggers and is one of the few contemporary African American musicians playing in the Appalachian tradition that once was an integral part of rural Black communities in the southeastern United States.

The conference will end on Sunday with religious services at Oakwood Avenue Presbyterian Church, followed by lunch and a tour in the early afternoon of Troy's historic Underground Rail-
